Per your request, Hart & Hickman, PC (H&H) has prepared an updated environmental justice, regulatory, and community sensitivity evaluation (Evaluation) for potential disposal facilities associated with the removal of coal combustion products (CCPs) from the property located at 828 Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd. in Chapel Hill (site). The initial Evaluation was prepared by Duncklee & Dunham dated October 17, 2019. Consistent with the 2019 Evaluation, the following landfills were included in our review:

- Upper Piedmont Environmental Landfill, 9650 Oxford Road, Rougemont, Person County, NC (Permit # 7304-MSWLF-1997);
- Uwharrie Environmental Regulatory Landfill, 500 Landfill Road, Mount Gilead, Montgomery County, NC (Permit # 6204-MSWLF-1995);
- Great Oak Landfill, 3597 Old Cedar Falls Road, Randleman, Randolph County, NC (Permit # 7607-MSWLF-2015);
- Sampson County Disposal, LLC, 7434 Roseboro Highway, Roseboro, Sampson County, NC (Permit # 8202-MSWLF-2000); and

- BFI Charlotte Motor Speedway V Subtitle D Landfill, 5105 Morehead Road, Concord, Cabarrus County, NC (Permit # 1304-MSWLF-1992).

H&H also reached out to Wake County to inquire about the South Wake Landfill in Apex, North Carolina, and its capacity to accept CCPs. Mr. Roy Baldwin, Solid Waste Facilities Manager, confirmed that while the South Wake Landfill is a Subtitle D Municipal Solid Waste landfill, it does not accept CCPs.

To complete the Evaluation, H&H attempted to utilize the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Environmental Justice Screening and Mapping Tool (EJSCREEN) and the North Carolina Department of Quality (NCDEQ) Community Mapping System to review available demographic data on population, race, income, gender, and health in the vicinity of each landfill. However, the EJSCREEN is no longer available, and information associated with demographics, race, income, gender, and health have been removed from the Community Mapping System. Additional sources reviewed include the November 2022 Justice40 Web Map, NCDEQ Division of Waste Management (DWM) Site Locator Tool, the NCDEQ Laserfiche public document portal, and verbal correspondence with select disposal facility representatives. A summary of our findings is provided in Table 1.

Based on the proximity of disadvantaged communities to select facilities, regulatory concerns, community sensitivity information, distance from the site, and/or other relevant information, H&H does not recommend disposal of CCPs at the following landfills: Great Oak Landfill (Randleman), Sampson County Disposal, LLC (Roseboro), or BFI Charlotte Motor Speedway V Subtitle D Landfill (Concord). Subject to approval by the respective facilities, the Upper Piedmont Environmental Landfill (Rougemont) and the Uwharrie Environmental Regulatory Landfill (Mount Gilead) may be suitable options for disposal of CCPs based on the Evaluation criteria.

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

(1) H&H reviewed publicly available documents on the North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality (NCDEQ) Laserfiche document portal for an evaluation of recent compliance violations, contaminant releases, community complaints, and on-going environmental monitoring activities. H&H also reviewed media reports related to community complaints associated with each of the landfills.

(2) The NCDEQ Community Mapping System was utilized for evaluation of available demographic information. As of February 2025, due to changes in federal demographic data availability, not all data was accessible; however, available information is included.

(3) Justice40 Tracts is a map released by ESRI in November 2022 as part of the Justice40 Initiative Criteria to identify disadvantaged communities across eight categories.

(4) Great Oak Landfill is categorized as disadvantaged based on the following: Climate Change, Water and Wastewater, and Health.

(5) Sampson County Landfill is categorized as disadvantaged based on the following: Climate Change, Energy, and Transportation.
